SCRIPTURE LESSON

First Reading: 2 Kings 4:42-44

A man came from Baal-shalishah, bringing food from the first fruits to the man of God: twenty loaves of barley and fresh ears of grain in his sack. Elisha said, "Give it to the people and let them eat." But his servant said, "How can I set this before a hundred people?" So he repeated, "Give it to the people and let them eat, for thus says the LORD, 'They shall eat and have some left.'" He set it before them, they ate, and had some left, according to the word of the LORD.

Gospel Reading: John 6:1-14

After this Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he

had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

Words of Institution (The Last Supper)

Holy are you, and blessed is your child, Jesus Christ – the one who preached good news, proclaimed liberty to the oppressed and taught us how to love one another.

We remember that it was around a table that Jesus gathered his disciples during his last week of life. Jesus reminded them of the work that he had done – how he had fed the hungry, included the outcast, performed miracles and challenged the status quo. He reminded them that God's vision was about forgiveness and loving our neighbours as ourselves.

And, as they sat and ate and remembered, Jesus took the bread that they were eating – and he gave thanks, he broke the bread, gave it to everyone gathered around the Table, and said, "take and eat – this is my body, broken for you. Whenever you eat of this bread, remember me."

And then he took the wine that they were drinking – and he gave thanks for the wine, gave it to those gathered around the Table and said, "this is my cup – poured out for you - whenever you drink this, remember that you are loved and you are forgiven."

As we remember and give thanks, we pray we might also join God's work of reconciliation and forgiveness, as we proclaim the mystery of faith.

Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.

Pour out your Holy Spirit on us gathered here today, and on these gifts of bread and wine. Make them be for us signs of God's love and forgiveness. Transform our lives that we may also be a sign of that love and forgiveness in our homes, in our neighbourhoods, and in the world. Amen.

Good News - The Rev. Sheena Trotter-Dennis will be doing pulpit supply at Knox for the month of October. Sheena is an ordained minister in the United Methodist Church USA. She served on the staff at Hillhurst United Church and has done pulpit supply in other surrounding congregations, including Grace Presbyterian Church and Ralph Connor Memorial United Church in Canmore. Sheena and her husband, Pete, are raising two teenagers, Katherine and Lauren.

MUSIC NOTES

PRELUDE: Blue Flag Iris is by Beverley McKiver (Anishinaabe composer/musician) living in Ottawa. The Blue Flag Iris is the floral emblem of Québec. McKiver dedicated this piece to "Joyce" – **Joyce Echaquan. September 28** marks the second anniversary of the death of this 37-year-old mother from the Atikamekw Nation – who gained national and global attention when she livestreamed her final moments as she lay dying in a Joliette, Québec hospital, recording racial slurs hurled at her from the hospital health staff. We remember Joyce, her beloved children and husband through this music.

MUSIC DURING CANDLELIGHTING: "Song for the 751" by Jessica McMann. In June 2021, Chief Cadmus Delorme of Cowessess First Nation announced to Canada that 751 unmarked graves had been found at the site of the former Marieval Indian Residential School (1899-1997), in Saskatchewan. Jessica is from Cowessess – her connections run deep.

GUEST MUSICIAN JESSICA McMANN

Jessica McMann is an Alberta-based Cree (Cowessess First Nation, Saskatchewan), multi-disciplinary artist. She interweaves land, Indigenous identity, history, and language throughout her dance and music creation/performance practice. A classically trained flutist, she holds a Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Calgary and an MFA in Contemporary Arts from Simon Fraser University. Her work fuses together traditional language and dance with her own contemporary experiences as an Indigenous woman and Two-Spirit person.

Partaking in an artist-in-residence program at the Banff Centre (2019) resulted in the Indigenous-Classical album *Incandescent Tales* which was released in June of 2021. This album was recorded in collaboration with pianist Beverley McKiver and violinist Karen Shepherd, and produced by Laura Vinson, all Indigenous women. She is currently working on her second album slated to be released mid-2023.

Her musical, composition, and soundscape work focuses on land-based creation and ideas of

connection, disconnection, and home. "Too Good; That *MAY* Be", an immersive soundscape performance was shown at the Urban Shaman Gallery in Winnipeg as part of "The 60's Scoop; A Place Between" in 2017. Her compositions include *Muskwa's Mountain Home* (2021), *Inni* (2018) and soundscapes including *beguiling* (the)the land (2020).

Jessica has played and performed venues and festivals across Canada, as well as toured in Sweden, Netherlands, and Belgium. She has created soundtracks for the ITWE Collective, performed with the Ambrose University Chamber Orchestra and the Foothills Philharmonic Orchestra in Alberta, and was a guest musician for Arcade Fire at the JUNOs. She has performed regularly with Laura Vinson and the Free Spirit as a dancer and musician.

Jessica McMann was nominated for the Western Canadian Music Awards Indigenous Artist of the Year 2022, and has won the following awards:

Global Music Awards 2022, Gold Medal: Indigenous Classical & Emerging Artist, Silver Medal: Composition, YYC Music Awards: Classical Album of the Year 2022
Jessica currently resides in Cochrane, Alberta, where she works for the City of Calgary as Curator of Indigenous Art. She is also co-founder and co-director of *Wild Mint Arts*, an Indigenous arts company, and is a Laureate of the Hnatyshyn Foundation REVEAL Indigenous Art Awards (2017).
